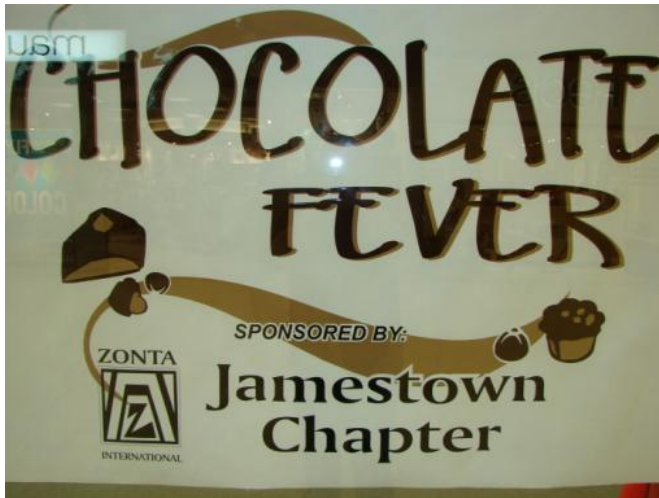

Plans for an art exhibit and sale, a martini mixer, a shoe party, two yellow rose luncheons, and the area meeting are keeping Zonta Clubs busy in Area 2.

In **Jefferson City**, plans are in full swing for the club's 9th annual **Women of Achievement Yellow Rose luncheon** set for April 29. This year's celebration award recipient and keynote speaker is Maxine Clark, founder and CEO of the Build-A-Bear Corporation, which is popular in shopping malls across the globe. In addition to Ms. Clark, 16 local women will be recognized for their dedication to the community, and 4 new 2nd chance scholarship recipients will be introduced. The Jefferson City club has also been invited to hold its March membership meeting in the **Missouri Governor's Mansion** and learn about the state's Mansion Preservation program.

On April 11, the **St. Charles Club** will host the first annual **Zonta St Charles Yellow Rose Luncheon**. St. Charles zontians will welcome **The Honorable Mary R. Russell**, MO Supreme Court Justice and member of the Jefferson City club, as its keynote speaker. The St. Charles club also continues to bring new and innovative ideas to Area 2 with the organization of a **Martini Mixer** and fund raiser for ZISVAW and a **Shoe Party and Membership Recruitment** event at the local Bronx & Diba Shoe Outlet. The **St. Louis Club** recently hosted a very successful **Trivia Night** with more than 200 people in attendance and raising more than \$2,000! On March 8, the St. Louis club co-sponsored a luncheon at which President Cheryl Bielema joined a panel describing current initiatives of Zonta International. Other Zontians described business and educational initiatives aimed at "Advancing the Status of Women Worldwide". The Club is now collaborating with the National Coalition of 100 Black Women to organize an **Art Exhibit and Sale** for June 13. The event will be both a service project and a fundraiser as they strive to provide a place for new and emerging artists to display their talents at a juried show. The event will be held at the Forest Park Community College Highlander Lounge Gallery. Top placing art pieces will be displayed at the Vaughn Cultural Center following the exhibit.

Members of the **Zonta Club of Cape Girardeau** are making plans to host District Governor Carol and area Zontians at the **Area 2 Meeting** on Saturday, April 12. In addition, the club is putting final touches on its **Annual Flea Market**, the club's 2nd largest fund raiser, which also takes place in April.

News from Area 3—JoAnn Hanson, Director

Each of the Area 3 Clubs has continued to demonstrate the spirit of Zonta through service and fellowship. **St. Cloud** continues to hold a special program meeting each month which offers the opportunity to hear and learn about areas of importance to the Zonta mission. Some program topics recently included Violence Against Women: From the Anna Maries Women's Shelter, the Advocacy and Criminal Justice Intervention Coordinator and the Child/Youth, Hospital, and School/Youth Program Coordinator came to speak on the state of affairs at the shelter. Immigration and issues facing us locally and nationally today provided another very interesting program. The St. Cloud Club also had an Amelia Earhart themed meeting. This included a young woman presenting her story of how she is about to become the first woman Hmong pilot and what that means for her culture and family. St. Cloud served at the Federation of the Blind spaghetti dinner which has become an annual service event. Three women in our area received their GED Scholarships from our Zonta Club. On a sad note, the St. Cloud Club lost a very long time, and tremendously devoted Zontian with the passing of Mary Knevel. For those in attendance at our 2006 Area Meeting held in St. Cloud, Mary spoke to us of her dear friendship with Amelia Earhart. Mary was a remarkable and wonderful woman.

For **Mankato** Club members, the January program featured a tour of the Open Door Health Center in Mankato. This is a non-profit facility to assist the uninsured or underinsured with their medical and dental needs. Their dental facility has recently expanded and they have a waiting list for their services. Each year, since 1998, the Zonta Club of Mankato has donated the proceeds from its annual fashion show to the Open Door. In March Mankato Zontians partner with the Mankato YWCA, BPW and WEB for "Women's Night Out," an event that promotes women in the community. The evening features boutiques and informational displays, comments by each organization president offering information, and an opportunity to visit with members from different organizations. Following dinner, a speaker is featured. This is a great opportunity for new member recruitment, and an opportunity for networking among the various clubs. Also in March, Mankato hosts their annual European Marketplace, featuring items, goods or services donated by our members. This silent auction is a fundraiser for the club's travel fund and also an opportunity to invite potential members and stay in touch with members who have left our club. Members no longer active in Zonta especially appreciate this fellowship event, as it allows them to re-connect. Dinner is catered and attendance is stellar; any member absent is often surprised with a special treasure purchased exclusively for her!

The **Brainerd** Zonta Club enjoyed its Holiday Party at the new restaurant of Club President, Ginny Knudson. JoAnn Hanson and prospective Minneapolis Club member Robyn West joined in the festivities. The silent auction of unique and rare Zonta pins was matched only by the white elephant gift exchange. In February, the Brainerd Club had a Valentine's Day party at the PORT Girls Home. Zontians made beaded bracelets with the girls, decorated Valentine cookies, and had a great time. The Brainerd Zonta club continues to have monthly career night with the girls at the PORT Girls Home. The annual Style Show sponsored by the Brainerd Club is scheduled for April 22, 2008, at the Cragun's Legacy, a beautiful resort just outside Brainerd. All Area 3 Zontians are welcome to attend. The **Austin** Club is busy planning for the Area 3 conference, but also finds time for service and fellowship. The Christmas party featured a mystery trip that included a stop for shopping and viewing an old home that is beautifully decorated for Christmas Holidays. This included wine tasting and appetizers. Everyone had a wonderful time seeing the Christmas decorations and spending time with each other.

In recognition of Amelia Earhart, **Austin** Zontians had a presentation on the life and accomplishments of Amelia Earhart followed by a quiz to see who could answer the most questions correctly. The winner was awarded a candle. Also, Mary Ann Law from the Parenting Resource Center spoke about the programs that are offered in support of families and children in Mower County. The organization has written grants to assist in building a new center in Austin. The center offers a place where divorced parents with children can exchange the children between the mother and father or use the location for supervised parental visits. The nut sales for the month of December went really well again this year with just a few bags of nuts left in inventory. Tickets for the Younkers Charity Event held on March 1 are on sale now. The \$5 ticket proceeds go directly to the Austin club and the person purchasing the ticket receives a \$10 coupon plus some additional 20% discount coupons.

The **Minneapolis** Club has successfully recruited three new members. It is now accepting applications for its primary beneficiary. News from Area 4—Sharon Stark, Director

Atchison: The Atchison Zonta Club donated \$50.00 to the Atchison Day Care Center and \$50.00 to Child Development Program. In January Lou Foudray, Curator at Amelia Earhart Home gave a presentation. February they talked about organization, membership and classification. The club gave \$60.00 for DOVES and members brought products they could use in the shelter.

Johnson County: The Zonta Club of Johnson County is co-hosting the annual Amelia Earhart Luncheon with the other Kansas City metro area clubs in January. They will looking for other opportunities to raise funds by proactively informing local PTAs and churches about our children's entertainment services (face painting, balloon animals and temporary tattoos). They have a long tradition of successfully raising scholarship funds with this activity but our venue for providing these services is no longer available.

Kansas City, KS: Jacqueline Fletcher was presented the Status of Women Award for her long-term service to the community at the Amelia Earhart Luncheon with the other Kansas City metro area clubs in January.

Kansas City I: Kansas City 1 also co-hosting the annual Amelia Earhart Luncheon with the other Kansas City metro area clubs in January.

Kansas City II: Kansas City II was also involved with the annual Amelia Earhart Luncheon with the other Kansas City metro area clubs in January. Their speaker for February was Laurann Schapler, Project Restoration International. After the initial chaos of the Chernobyl disaster had settled, Laurann felt there was still concern as many children were and still are being born with physical and mental disabilities. Many of these children especially girls are sent to orphanages and receive limited medical intervention as well as little education and training. She has worked with both governments as well as recruited volunteers to get many of these young girls and women to the Kansas City area to receive medical treatment during the summers and well as education and training to provide some basic trade skills for when they are kicked out of the orphanages. Their annual fundraiser and International Club Fundraiser will be on March 15, 2008. India will be the country and they will focus on.

Topeka: Susan Marchant of the Topeka /Shawnee County Library was the speaker at the January meeting. She did a presentation called "Looking for Amelia Earhart." Plans are underway for our imaginative and unique celebration of Zonta Rose Day. This year we will be honoring the women of Greensburg, Kansas who are diligently fighting hard to rebuild their town, which was devastated by a tornado last spring. In particular, we will pay tribute to those who have been instrumental in re-establishing the Greensburg School System. Because there is no school structure at this time, classes (K-12) are being held in trailers and portable units where the teachers are doing their best to provide a good education for their students with the limited resources on hand. Since the advancement of education is one of the primary objectives of Zonta, it was decided that the teachers, paraprofessionals, and secretarial staff of Greensburg should be recognized for their extraordinary spirit and efforts in rebuilding the town and school system. Therefore, yellow roses will be presented to approximately thirty people and a donation will be made to the "Friends of Education Charitable Trust, a scholarship fund for eligible Greensburg seniors who wish to pursue higher education.

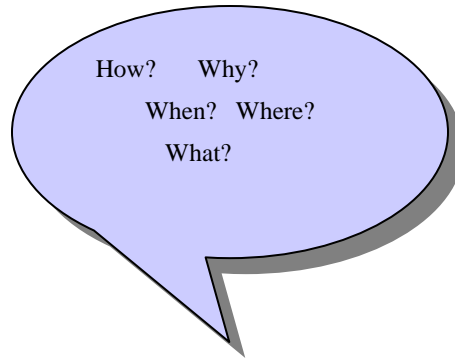




OMC Update—Kathy Swan, Chair

Treasurer's Update—Janet Kannard

With three more paid members from the Aberdeen Club, we currently have 577 District 7 members. This is two over the budgeted amount of 575, but less than last year. With the pending chartering of Troy, MO, club, our membership numbers will increase over the 584 members we had on May 31, 2007!

Kudos to the Show-Me state clubs in Area 2 who have increased their membership by 20 members since last year and are in the process of chartering a new club in Troy, Missouri!

The following clubs have increased their total membership since last year.

Jefferson City, MO—86 paid members (increase of 11 members over last year)

St. Charles, MO—22 paid members (increase of 5 members over last year)

St. Louis, MO—48 paid members (increase of 4 members over last year)

Austin, MN—17 paid members (increase of 3 members over last year)

St. Cloud, MN—35 paid members (increase of 3 members over last year)

Atchison, KS—18 paid members (increase of 3 members over last year)

Johnson County, KS—20 paid members (increase of 1 member over last year)

Topeka, KS—22 paid members (increase of 1 member over last year)



United Nations Update—Kay Moss, Chair

I thought I'd share some of the very basic tenants of Zonta's relationship with the United Nations, as we look toward March 8th **International Women's Day (and Zonta Rose Day)** and know that each Club has received encouragement to raise awareness of the status of women throughout the world.

Zonta International service has been closely linked with the United Nations since Zonta expressed support for the fledgling UN in 1946. We are an accredited Non-Governmental Organization (NGO), linked with the UN through the processes of written and oral presentations, even organizing panel discussions on issues being considered by the UN.

So ... how much influence do we really have? Zonta maintains representatives of its United Nations Committee at UN sites in Geneva, New York, Paris and Vienna. Committee members attend UN conferences, and UN agency, committee and commission sessions.

For over 20 years, Zonta has had general consultative status with the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), *one of six principal bodies* carrying out UN work. To further focus that statement, ECOSOC is responsible for actions on two-thirds of UN programs. To list a few:

- Economic issues such as trade, industrialization and development, as well as

- Social issues such as women's rights, children and social welfare.

- They also make recommendations on how to improve education and health conditions and

- Promote respect for and observance of the human rights and freedoms of people everywhere.

Zonta is one of many NGOs associated with the **United Nations Department of Public Information** because of its strong programs on issues of concern to women. The UN provides NGOs access to information and materials, and the NGOs agree to disseminate information to their membership. But again, just having access to the information doesn't foster actions.

To actually do the work of the ECOSOC, Zonta International takes an active role in the **Commission on the Status of Women (CSW)**, *one of the nine functional ECOSOC committees*. CSW is the leading policymaking body concerned with women's rights and the equal status of women. Since 1946, the CSW has convened an annual conference, now attended by thousands of women worldwide, to discuss issues of paramount concern for women.

So now we've come full circle ... As your Clubs 'take action' for Rose Day, reference the Zonta International website. Click on "**Zonta International and the United Nations**" and you will find on the lower right section of that page, not only information (i.e.: the Executive Summary from the UN Secretary Generals study on Violence Against Women) but also 'actions' in a statement of 'what works' in the fight against violence.

District 7 is urging each Club to do something for Rose Day. It could be to target local officials or personalities with a Yellow Rose and the small business card from the Zonta Store that describes "What Is Zonta?" or you could add a flyer about your local Club and our international work with and through the UN. Please don't allow International Women's Day to go unnoticed in your community!



YWPA Update—Linda Linn, Coordinator

The goal of the Zonta International Young Women in Public Affairs (YWPA) Program is to encourage more young women to participate in public and political life by recognizing a commitment to the volunteer sector, evidence of volunteer leadership achievements and a dedication to the advancement of the status of women.

At your club level, the YWPA program offers opportunity to generate publicity that projects Zonta as an organization committed to programs that work to advance the status of women. Publicize the YWPA award in

your communities to any pre-university or pre-college woman student, aged 16-20 at the time of application. Distribute, receive and evaluate applications. Handwritten applications will not be accepted and should not be submitted. Select one application to send to me at the address below. Club recipient must be selected and received by April 1, 2008.

At the district level we will select a recipient from the applications received from clubs within the district. The Zonta International Foundation provides \$500 for each district

winner. Our District will then submit the recipient's application to International for an opportunity to receive \$1,000.

ZISVAW Update—Sherrill Mulhern, Coordinator

It's March again, and Zontians will be joining women and girls all across District 7 for celebrations of National Women's History Month. There will be guest lecturers, seminars and proclamations. In addition there will be special events devoted to this year's theme of Women's Art: Women's Vision that will provide everyone with the opportunity to discover and honor women's visual arts in a variety of forms and mediums.

However, even as we revisit and celebrate the accomplishments of the women who have gone before us, this very special month also affords us Zontians a unique opportunity to reaffirm our commitment to women of the future and the Zonta International Strategies to Prevent Violence Against Women. It is a Challenge Grant created by the United Nations Foundation. The Foundation is donating \$1 for each of the

first 100,000 signatures to the online "Say No to Violence" campaign that is currently being run by the UN Development Fund for Women, UNIFEM. The totality of the contributions will go to the UNIFEM-managed UN Trust Fund to End Violence against Women. This Trust Fund supports innovative initiatives by governments and non-governmental organizations to end violence against women. Since its establishment in 1996,

it has helped fund some 250 initiatives in 120 countries. This is effective advocacy for women, made easy. I urge you all to go to the website <http://www.saynotoviolence.org>, follow the simple instructions, and add your name to the list of over 45,600 women who have already signed on to this important international campaign.

Service Update—Jan Ruopp, Coordinator

The Zonta Club of Cape Area held a retreat/renewal this January to do some strategic planning for next year and the years to come. We reviewed the meaning behind the Zonta emblem, we talked membership, but most importantly we talked about advocacy and how it relates to service.

Advocacy is the expression of support for or opposition to a cause, argument, or proposal. Advocacy may include influencing laws, legislation, or attitudes. Advocacy is meant to get clubs more publicity, more results from service and ultimately more members.

To further advocacy, Zonta International encourages us to work through Zonta International Foundation and its partners, not to freelance. There are many good ideas available on

the website. Some clubs that do advocacy through service and do it well are Anchorage, Alaska and Sanibel/Captiva. Just go to the website and look at their service projects.

When you look at what is suggested and compare that to what you are currently doing as a club, how does your club compare to the guidelines suggested? Do your service projects reflect the mission of Zonta?

The main purpose of Zonta service is to advance the status of women worldwide. We will magnify our Zonta voice, if we partner with Zonta International Foundation and like minded organizations like the American Association of University Women or League of Women Voters. In addition your individual club should keep up with the

positions on women's issues through Zonta International and your District Board to utilize the resources of service providers in your area that address these needs. These providers can help educate your club and provide relevant service as well.

Getting started with advocacy is easy and necessary if we want to increase membership through service. The first thing that you must do is to get educated and the best way to get educated is to visit the Zonta International website at www.zonta.org. Be a catalyst in your club. Figure out what might help you leverage your clubs efforts on existing activities and just do it. Let's make the next biennium the best yet through utilization of our resources. It's in place for us, we just have to use it.

A remarkable and wonderful woman, and as some members express below, was such a joy to know:

Another link to that era is gone.....personally I feel blessed to have gotten to meet her two years ago.

As for a memory of Mary, she always attended the Area and District meetings. Knew everyone - always looked for her favorite clowns. Nearly every year she had a dinner at her home as a Zonta fund raiser. Always had "Amelia Earhart" potatoes. She was a classy dresser, when fashion boots came into vogue; she was the first one to wear them to Zonta.
